Are you interested in Transitions?

The Transitions program is for any student going into grade 11 or 12 who is unsure of what they want to do in the workplace; giving them hands-on experience at the Charlottetown Prince of Wales Campus. For the first while, mentors will get to know students on a personal level, then, students will be divided into small groups. There are five mentors covering courses in culinary and community, trades, sports and media also covering kinesiology, arts and media, and finally health care rotation. You will be put into small groups depending on class sizes, roughly 5 or 6 people per group.

Transitions is an afternoon program worth 2 credits. Throughout the semester you and your group, after each rotation, make and present a slideshow to present your learnings to the class. Around midterm, and again for finals, you write a short essay (approximately 1 page) answering questions and on your personal experience. Attendance and taking part in group days are the biggest chunk of your grades. -Author, Anastasia MacLeod

Emily Richard (Culinary and Community)- "Transitions is a great opportunity to experience a post-secondary environment and learn more about different career opportunities for teenagers in PEI high schools. You will meet instructors and business owners, experience various programs, and learn new skills that apply to whichever future career you choose to pursue."

Ryan Maxwell (Sports Marketing)- "Transitions helps build confidence and resilience in high school students across PEI. With a 1-5 student mentor ratio, the small groups really give the students the opportunity to engage with the mentor more than they would in a classroom setting. The small group setting also promotes teamwork and problem solving skills and always allows for a stronger peer connection. Over the course of the semester students will present a minimum of 6 times with their group. With this comes some anxiety, however with each presentation, we see improvement in body language, eye contact and overall confidence.

Julia MacSwain (Health)- "This course is all about helping students figure out what comes next after high school. Through hands-on activities, real-world experiences, and opportunities to work within the community, students explore different careers, build practical life skills, and gain confidence for adulthood. This course focuses on active, student-based learning to help students re-engage with school and make informed choices about post-secondary pathways that are right for them."

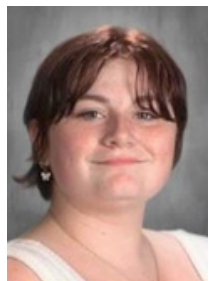

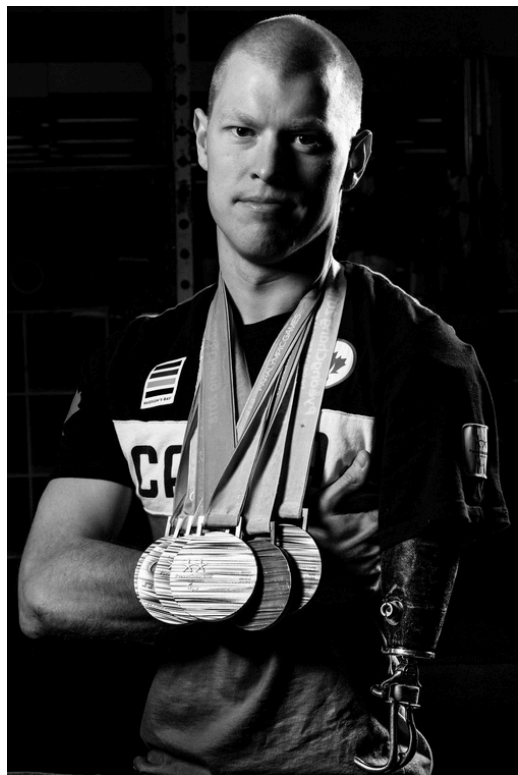

Mr. Lamey's SCI 701 have been busy building their first robots of the semester! They are working with the friction grabber arm to complete the obstacle course!

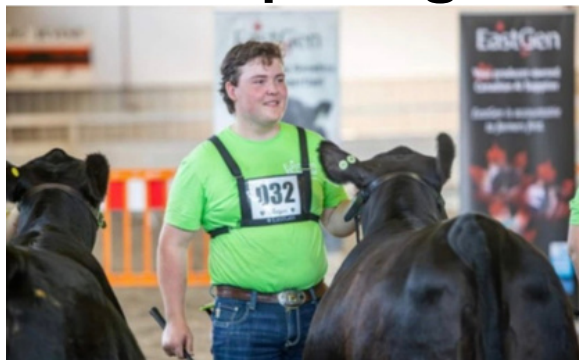
Chem 621A class took their understanding of energy and burned food to determine how much energy it takes to burn off food and in turn calculate the amount of food calories in food!

Test Prep - March 24

Getting ready for a test isn't just about cramming the night before—it's about building good habits that help you feel confident and do your best. Learning how to prepare and take a test is important because it helps you remember more, lowers stress, and makes you feel in control. A few smart strategies can really help as you prepare for the test as well as while you are writing the test.

Test Prep Checklist for High School Students:

- ✓ Start early – Review a little each day instead of cramming the night before.
- ✓ Make a plan – Create a study schedule so you know what topics to cover.
- ✓ Quiz yourself – Use practice questions, flashcards, or old tests.
- ✓ Teach it – Explain the material to a friend or even out loud to yourself.
- ✓ Stay organized – Keep your notes, handouts, and study guides in one place.
- ✓ Take breaks – Study in chunks (25-30 minutes) and then rest for a few minutes.
- ✓ Take care of yourself – Get enough sleep, eat well, and drink water before test day.

How to Create Effective Slideshows - April 1

Creating effective slideshows helps you share your ideas clearly, keeps your audience engaged, and makes your presentations more professional. A good slideshow is more than just putting words on slides—it's about making your message easy to understand.

Creating Effective Slideshows:

- ✓ Keep it simple – Use short phrases or keywords, not full paragraphs.
- ✓ Make it visual – Add pictures, diagrams, or charts to support your points.
- ✓ Stay consistent – Use the same font, matching colours, and slide design.
- ✓ Limit text – Aim for no more than 5-6 bullet points per slide.
- ✓ Choose readable fonts – Stick with clear, easy-to-read styles and big enough sizes.
- ✓ Use color wisely – Pick colors that look good together and make text easy to read.
- ✓ Practice your talk – Don't just read the slides; use them as support while you explain. Remember, the slides guide your audience, but *you* explain the details.

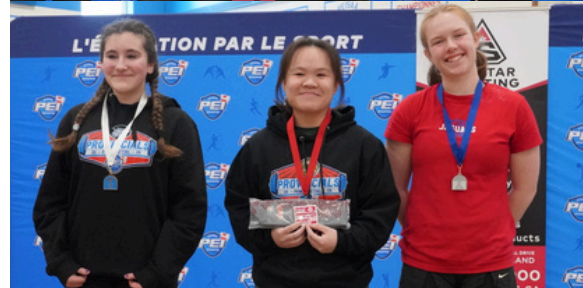


Athletics

Do you have any past experiences?

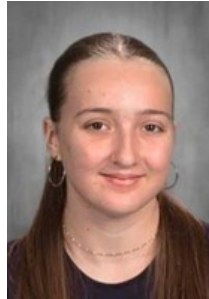
I have been acting for the past 6 years and it's something I really enjoy.

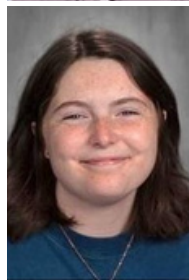
Naomi Essery Grade 12

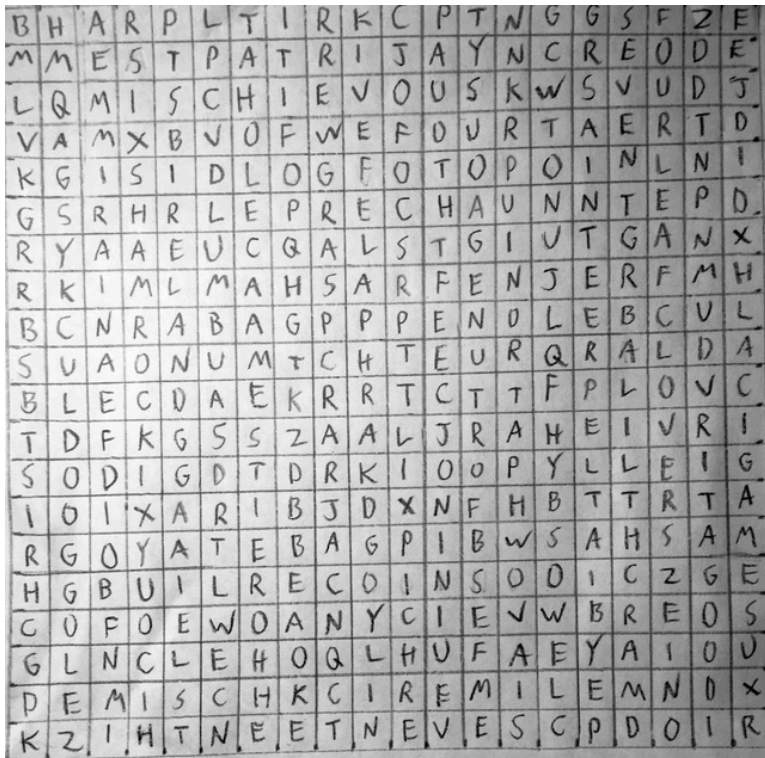

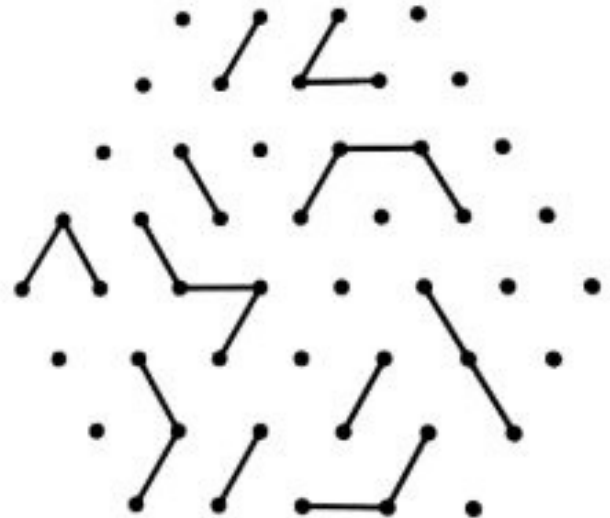


